Activities to Encourage Language

- talk about everything
- narrate their play
- narrate your and their actions
- comment on things in the environment
- label items and actions
- engage in conversations
- model language whenever possible

- imitate the sounds that the person makes and encourage them to imitate you
- tune into the person's interests
- engage in the person's preferred activities, and use as much language as possible (e.g., if a person loves blocks, play with them and label colours, narrate stacking them, count blocks, prompt them to requests for blocks)
- contrive situations (e.g., give the person paper with no marker and ask what they want)
- take turns during play, and prompt the person to request for items
- encourage using language to get what they want (e.g., if you know the person wants a cookie, then hold up a cookie, and encourage the person to use the word, then hand them the cookie)

- when opportunities for language arise, pause for 3-5 seconds to wait for them to use language
- if there is no response, model the language to prompt imitation (e.g., if the person has a bowl of soup with no spoon, hold up a spoon, wait 3-5 seconds, then model saying "spoon")
- provide praise for their response or attempt at saying the word, and provide the item

- read a variety of books
- explain pictures, and provide your own narration
- sing songs
- read the same books or sing the same songs repeatedly, and encourage them to fill in words
